Art opened my eyes to a whole new world of possibilities, and MIAD gave me the courage to seek those possibilities out and understand their power.

My life map shows that I prayed for a scholarship and grants to cover my tuition at MIAD. What it doesn't show is the tears of overwhelming joy and thankfulness that ran down my face when I received that scholarship.

Donors like you are the only reason I could afford to attend a great college like MIAD.

You and MIAD let me dream; you made seeing the world a possibility that could be obtained. You brought a "good job" that could support a family within my grasp. You made it possible for me to get something in order to give back to where I came from. My life would have been very different without those dreams and the help I got to realize them.

Today, I am a creative professional. Because of people like you and your generosity I can stand here today and tell you that I will be receiving my Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in a week, then flying to Japan to work on shooting a short webseries with two musicians from Milwaukee and L.A. And after that I will be starting my full-time job on the Digital Innovations team at Kohl's Corporate Office, where I've been an intern for two years.

I'll be earning more than anyone else in my immediate family. Some of them have been working for over 40 years. And it's all thanks to the donations people like you have made.
